A message from Place2Be.....

Hello again children of St Paul's, from Place2Be!



Let's start with a check-in again like we normally would.....how have you been feeling this week?

As we come to the end of your year at school - we know that things may have felt a bit different this year.

We've spoken before about how changes can give us all sorts of feelings.....and some people describe feelings like a 'rollercoaster'! This means that as we travel through our time in school, we might feel like we're whooshing to the top of the fastest rollercoaster in the world, feeling full of joy and excitement. We might also feel other ways at times though. A rollercoaster can suddenly feel like it's racing downwards instead of upwards, and your feelings might change too. You might feel sad, bored, sleepy, worried, or angry before the rollercoaster climbs up to its peak again!

All families should have received an email with a Summer Holiday Activity Pack for their children. These have a range of different activities that you may wish to do with you child during the summer break.

The Ideas Store has <u>lots of free digital activi-</u> <u>ties</u> planned for children throughout the Summer holidays too.

If children sign up to go to 6 of these (so basically one each week of the holidays) they get a medal for each activity and 6 medals gets a certificate.



School clothing grants

School clothing grants can help towards the cost of a school uniform for children aged 11 who are moving from primary to secondary school. Only one grant is payable during a child's school life.

Applications can only be made between 30 June and 30 September each year. Late applications will only be considered in exceptional circumstances.

How do I apply?

Where a family receive housing benefit or council tax benefit from Tower Hamlets, the grant is normally paid without the need to make a separate application.

If not, you should complete the <u>school clothing grant application form</u>.

How will I be paid?

All school clothing grants are paid into a bank or building society account in your name.

FREE SCHOOL MEALS IN ENGLAND

Make sure you're not missing out!

Many families are entitled to free school meals but are not claiming this support. Free school meals support in the form of supermarket vouchers or food parcels will be provided over the summer holidays for all children who are registered for free school meals. Apply as soon as possible to your school or local authority so that you don't miss out.

This information sheet will explain if you might be eligible for free school meals and how to apply. It includes information for families that receive welfare support and for families with **no recourse to public funds (NRPF)**.

The families of children that were getting universal infant free school meals because they were in reception, year 1 or year 2 should apply for support if they fall into any of the groups explained on this sheet.

Your child might be eligible for free school meals if you or your child receives any of the following:

- Income Support
- Income-based Jobseeker's Allowance
- Income-related Employment and Support Allowance
- Support under Part VI of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999
- The guaranteed element of Pension Credit
- Child Tax Credit (provided you're not also entitled to working Tax Credit and have an annual gross income of no more than £16,190)
- Working Tax Credit run-on paid for 4 weeks after you stop qualifying for Working Tax Credit
- Universal Credit your household income must be less than £7,400 a year (after tax and not including any benefits you get)

Temporary extension to free school meals for some families with no recourse to public funds (NRPF)

Thousands of families with no recourse to public funds (NRPF) have become temporarily eligible for free school meals support until schools reopen for all children. To get this support over the summer holidays your child must be registered for free school meals. Apply as soon as possible to your school or local authority so that you don't miss out.

If you have NRPF your child can get free school meals if your household earnings are less than £16,190 per year and if:

- You are a Zambrano carer A non-EEA National primary carer of a British child
- Your family is receiving support from a local authority under Section 17 of the Children's Act 1989 (for example, from social services or the NRPF team)
- Your family has been granted leave to remain with NRPF on the basis of family or private life grounds

All children from families who receive Section 4 support from the Home Office are also temporarily eligible for free school meals and do not need to have their income assessed.
